


Reminder - 3 Cultural Dimensions


- Individualism vs. Collectivism
 - The extent to which people feel independent as opposed to interdependent



- Power Distance
 - The extent to which less powerful members of organizations/society accept and expect that power is distributed unequally



- Uncertainty Avoidance
 - A society's tolerance for uncertainty and ambiguity




Application of Cultural Dimension Theory

- One obvious way to 'slice' society and consider cultural dimension theory is along national boundaries
- Extensive studies have done exactly this and can give an interesting overview of the world community 'at a glance'

Individualism vs. Collective


 There is a clear tendency for first world 'western' countries to be much more individualistic in nature

Collectivism - Individualism World map




Power Distance


Power Distance World map



- Groupings again roughly correspond to first world western countries with low power distance
- In this case though, it's not as clear there is substantial variation in this dimension across Europe

Uncertainty Avoidance World map





 Uncertainty avoidance has very different distribution globally - the USA stands out as one of the most uncertainty tolerant nations

What does this NOT tell us?

- The absolute numbers tell us very little what are useful are the world-wide patterns, and relative values
- All of these dimensions over-simplify
 - What can be substantial in-country variations are lost
 - These are essentially somewhat insightful stereotypes in no way can this type of analysis replace one-on-one interaction and getting to know people

What can we learn then?

- This type of cultural dimension analysis can be a tool for us
- Consider letters of reference
 - You know the letter writer great, you can effectively "read between the lines"
 - You don't know the letter writer...
 - Their country of origin, and the analysis shown might help you to interpret the subtleties within a letter more effectively

A few examples

 A letter has a 'cold', or 'distant' tone

 The letter is brutally honest and hyper-direct

 A letter seems to promote the team, and doesn't hype the candidate directly

A few examples

 - ⇒ Look at the power-distance metric
- The letter is brutally honest and hyper-direct
 - ⇒ Consider uncertainty avoidance
- A letter seems to promote the team, and doesn't hype the candidate directly
 - ⇒ The individualistic vs. collectivist metric is relevant here
